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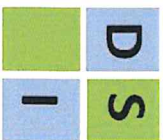
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



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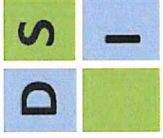
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DSI PROJECT: Digital Social Innovation.

Synthesized Presentation of Good Practices December 9, Alzira. MANRA.

The Mancomunitat de la Ribera Alta, during the event that took place in Alzira, has presented 3 good practices of digital social innovation in social education found in Spain.

The first one was a project by the name of Genios project, a collaboration between Google and an NGO “Ayuda in Action” with the main objective of bringing the world of science and technology to children on equal term (Economic and gender). This project specificity is that it introduced and formed the students to a creative and better use of digital innovation but it also formed the teacher to be able to continue those digital courses through the implementation of digital instructors into a network of schools all over Spain. It’s also interesting to add that it has the capacity to be implemented into other countries since it’s already planned to take place in Portugal in 2020.

The second one presented was a website by the name of “Hacesfalta” from the foundation “Hazloposible”. Its purpose is to facilitate and boost, through innovation, the participation of people and companies in social causes and volunteering. What makes this website a good practice is its capacity to give a complete scope of the collaboration between citizens and NGO’s. It proposes to volunteers to act on local or international sphere, through physical or virtual volunteering and the domain of predilection (immigration, addiction, ICT courses). It also has an employment section, to upload its professional profile or for NGO’s to post job opportunities and finally it has a donation section where projects are posted with their description and the economic help needed. Being able to propose so much services in a single website make this good practice a great tool for any social educator or volunteer.



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The third and last example presented was “The Redconsejos Project” by the Special Education center “Fernando Arce School”. The project goal is to promote the safe use of networks and the awareness of possible internet risks to young people over 16 years of age with intellectual disabilities and with a curricular level corresponding to the 4th year of Primary. The didactic unit work on content related to the safe use of the internet, netiquette, cyberbullying, digital identity or the safe use of social networks. After the classroom work, the students create their own guidelines by editing photographs or videos with messages that they can publish on the blog and instagram account of the project. This Special Education school innovative methodology is through its commitment to the use of the social media as a strategy for the promotion of digital and social inclusion of students with disabilities.

Conclusions:

The meeting was really prolific, with plenty of interesting experiences shared by the different partners, giving us distinctive aspects that can take digital social innovation. The Manra focused on general examples found in Spain with an implementable capacity tackling the main problem on how to include digital innovation into an inclusive (diversity, equity and social strata) education from an NGO and social education centers point of view.
